Upcoming Wild Women Workshop - September

Wild Women are cute little dolls (2 to 4 inches tall) made from scraps of fabric and yarn, beads and buttons. They can become detachable accessories, hanging ornaments or name tags. Every doll is as unique as its creator.

Most of the required materials will be provided but bring your own scissors and large eye embroidery/ craft needle. Is the need to knit gnawing at you?

Try one of these.

<u>Hand puppets</u>, either knit or crochet, are always a sell out.

This is a cute knit pattern from Creative Knitting Magazine that can be adapted to become any number of different animals besides the mouse and the piglet variations provided. Imagine a giraffe, zebra, calico cat, dog or . . . well, you get the idea.



Ear shapes and body colour are the key. Eyes and nose should be embroidered rather than sew-on buttons to meet the safety guidelines. Get the pattern HERE.

Have you tried a Boneyard Shawl?



I have just started my first one, shown above, and it is an easy and versatile pattern. Begin in the middle and knit from the top, it makes a lovely triangle shawl.

The best part is you can use the same yarn throughout - takes about 600 meters of DK weight yarn - or mix colours and even change patterns with each set of 12 stitches.

Those ribs do not have to be evenly spaced either. If you have a few skeins of complimentary colours, try using one colour until it is gone then do the rib and change colours. Especially effective if you have a monochromatic scheme and grade from dark to light or vice versa. Try one and let your imagination go to suit your stash or ours.

Or make some of Joyce Goddard's cute <u>little girl's</u> <u>purses</u>.

This cutie is made from seven, 4.5 inch squares; one for the bottom, four for the sides and the last two cut in half and used on the sides to create a top when the bag is drawn closed.



Make a similar-sized lining of a contrasting fabric and put them together with a casing top. Thread two drawstrings into the casing and finish the ends of the drawstrings with little cover-tubes to hide the knots.

Now for something completely different!

Consider making one or two of these hot (or cool, depending on your perspective) <u>casserole carriers</u>. These are new this year and we expect them to sell well.

They are quick and easy to make using either prequilted fabric or quilt your own. Your quilting can be as simple or complex as you like.
